The majority of poems will be found in the non-fiction collection in the 800s; **if you browse the shelves there, start with 808.1 and all numbers beginning with 811, 821, and 831.**

A single poem may be written and illustrated as a single volume, such as "Casey at the Bat," but most poems are collected in an anthology with other poems-some by one poet, others with an editor and many poets. Often "poetry" is a subheading for other subjects; see examples below.

VERSE

While perhaps not considered poetry, many stories are told in verse. There are also nursery rhymes and jump rope/counting rhymes which are also part of *traditional literature*.

INTRODUCTION

The following “pathfinder” was designed to provide guidance in searching for types of children’s books using the Curriculum Lab Online Catalog. Each genre is defined, followed by examples of subject or keyword headings that can be searched from the Basic Search screen. In some cases more advanced strategies are suggested. A short bibliography of relevant reference books for each genre from the Lab’s Reference Collection is also included.

To access the Curriculum Lab catalog from our Home Page, go to <http://www.education.uiowa.edu/crl/> and click on *Catalog, Databases*, then select *Search Our Catalog*. To access a variety of topical bibliographies prepared by Curriculum Lab staff, go to the same website and click on *Bibliographies*.

In general:

Authors and titles of specific children’s books can be searched by performing either an author or title search from the Basic Search screen.

For information about children’s literature, do a subject heading search for *children’s literature* or *young adult literature*. For ideas about using & teaching with children’s literature see the subheading *Study and teaching*; and for audio-visual adaptations of children’s books use the subheading *AV*.

Also, for internet links to children’s literature sites, go to the Curriculum Lab web page, click on *Curriculum Links*, then under Areas of Emphasis, click on *Children’s/YA Literature*.

INFORMATIONAL BOOKS

Informational books are non-fiction books about people, places, events, or things, or books that tell the reader how to do something, such as how to make a kite or how to draw a shark. The call number must begin with a Dewey Decimal number but not 292 (myths) 398 (folklore) or many of the 800s (poetry and literature collections). Books located in the 920s are biographies/autobiographies

To browse: Wander through the non-fiction Dewey Decimal shelves, excluding the 292s, 398s, 800s, and 920s.

 To find books and materials using Curriculum Lab Catalog: Select Search Type: Subject Heading, then enter words or phrases such as the following examples: (Note: do not use any with the "fiction" subheading)

For more unusual subjects that might appear in an informational book but may not appear as a subject heading, or if you want as many books as possible, follow these instructions precisely:

Go to **Advanced Search**


In the first Search type option box, keep **Keyword Anywhere**

Pull down menus - change to **not** in both boxes

Change Search type to **Subject words**

In the Search for boxes, type in **fiction** and **study**.

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4. Picture Storybooks/Concepts/Wordless and more.

Technically speaking, a picture book is a 32-page book that uses either illustrations and text or all illustrations to tell a story or provide information. The term "picture book" describes a format - stories, poetry, folklore, biographies, and informational books may all be found in picture book format. However, more generally the term picture book is used to describe all books for young children, including board books, toy books, concept books and beginning-to-read books as well as the more typical picture storybook.

To browse the shelves:

Look in the *E (Easy/Everybody)* section for board, concept, alphabet, counting, wordless, beginning-to-read and picture storybooks. Many concept, alphabet and counting books will be found in the non-fiction collection as well as in the "E" section.

Try the following searches to find books and materials using the Curriculum Lab catalog:

BIOGRAPHY AND AUTOBIOGRAPHY

Biographies are factual books written about people; autobiographies are books people write about themselves. Most children's books about people are biographies. Some books are collective biographies—books about more than one person. An example is *Women Explorers of the Air: Harriet Quimby, Bessie Coleman, Amelia Earhart, Beryl Markham, Jacqueline Cochran*. Others are individual biographies about one person, such as *Up in the Air: The Story of Bessie Coleman*.

To browse:

- *Most *collective* biographies can be found in non-fiction in the 920s.
- *Most *individual* biographies can be found in 921, alphabetically by the last name of the person the book is about.
- *Some biographies may be shelved in the Dewey Decimal sections for the various professions, ie. Scientists (500's) , Inventors (600's), etc.

To find books and materials using Curriculum Lab Catalog:

If you know the name of the person in whom you are interested, perform a **subject** search by entering his or her **last name**. Otherwise, use a profession as your subject search term. Many subjects are also followed by the subheading "biography."

Picture Storybooks

Picture storybooks are fictional stories told in picture book format. They are shelved in the "E" section alphabetically by author's last name. Picture storybooks can be found by looking under any number of subject headings (cats--fiction, friendship--fiction) or keywords in the catalog. Use the Basic Search to search for specific authors or titles.

6. FOLK TALES, FAIRY TALES & OTHER TRADITIONAL LITERATURE

Traditional literature is the term used to describe various forms of folklore, stories that come from the oral tradition. They do not have a known originating author, but have been collected and retold by people like the Grimm Brothers. Traditional literature includes folktales, mythology, legends, tall tales, folk songs, nursery rhymes and fairy tales. If the story is clearly the original work of the author and is not a retelling, it is NOT traditional literature; original stories by known authors are considered fiction. For example, fairy tales by Hans Christian Andersen, are *not* traditional literature – he wrote them. Folklore may appear as a single illustrated story in picture book format, or a number of stories may be collected into an anthology. The top line of the call number must be a Dewey Decimal number.

To browse the shelves:

In non-fiction, browse call numbers 292 and 398 through 398.9

Historical fiction is a term used to describe stories that are set in the past. While “the past” may be vague, one definition is that the book is set one generation—or a minimum of 20 years—prior to when the book was actually written. Unless the time period is an important aspect of the story, often the subject headings do not reflect the time but only the more general subjects of the book. When looking for historical fiction, do subject searches for historical events or countries, with the subheading “Fiction.” Non-fiction books about the event or country will have Dewey Decimal numbers for call numbers. Historical fiction can be found in both picture storybooks (E) and in chapter books/novels (F).

The call number must begin with an E or an F. Click on Display full record to see the summary that describes the story and can help you to determine if the book is historical fiction or a different genre.


FANTASY, ANIMAL FANTASY

Fantasy describes those stories that could not happen in real life. They are works of known authors who created the stories (those that came from the oral tradition are considered traditional literature). Fairy tales by known authors, such as those by Hans Christian Andersen, are considered modern fantasy. There are often talking animals, an element of magic, or imaginative creatures in tales of fantasy. Fantasies can be found in picture books (E) and in novels (F). Anthologies of fantasy stories may be found in the non-fiction section. *Note: If the call number is a Dewey Decimal Number that begins with 398, this is traditional literature, not modern fantasy.*

SCIENCE FICTION

The line between Fantasy and Science Fiction is often a thin one. Science fiction stories could not happen in real life at this time. These books involve some aspect of science or technology. Futuristic stories are often science fiction. Science Fiction can be in picture book format (E) or a novel (F).

CONTEMPORARY REALISTIC FICTION

Realistic fiction is a term used to describe stories that could actually have happened. Contemporary realistic fiction means the book is set either "now" or in the recent past. Books with talking animals or set in a place or time that do not exist (fantasy) or stories set in the past (historical fiction) are not contemporary realistic fiction. Realistic fiction can be found in either picture storybooks (E) or in chapter books/novels (F).


The call number *must* begin with an E or an F. Often the subheading "Fiction" follows the subject heading. When viewing a brief record, click on "Display full record" to see a summary of the book, which may help you determine that the book is contemporary realistic fiction and not historical fiction or fantasy.


10. **MULTICULTURAL/DIVERSE/INTERNATIONAL LITERATURE**

Multicultural literature is a term used to describe literature of, by, or about various racial/ethnic/cultural groups. Sometimes the term is also used for books about sexual identity, disabilities, and age. Usually it is used to describe books portraying people that are not of Anglo-Saxon origin. Many books that are culturally neutral or generic do not have an assigned racial/ethnic subject heading, but most books that are "culturally specific" will have such a subject heading. The terms that are used as subject headings are chosen by the Library of Congress. Multicultural literature is found throughout the collection in Easy, Fiction, and Non-Fiction.
